Welcome

Dear Supporters, Alumni, Mentors and Friends,

We are pleased to share Fight for Sight's (FFS) 2018-2019 Annual Report with you. Over seven decades ago, FFS's Founder Mildred Weisenfeld, who lost her sight from retinitis pigmentosa, started our organization determined to cure blinding eye diseases by funding promising eye and vision researchers early in their careers. In 2018 and 2019 we funded 34 new clinical and academic researchers from some of the nation's most prestigious institutions including the Schepens Eye Research Institute, United States Army Institute of Surgical Research, University of Washington, Cleveland Clinic and University of Houston, to name but a few. The thumbnail descriptions included in this report briefly describe their work. FFS is thrilled to be the first source of funding for many of them.

In recent decades, FFS has funded extraordinary eye and vision science, including the development of the intraocular lens, donor cornea preservation, various applications of ophthalmic lasers, glaucoma therapies and ocular stem cell research. Many of our past grantees have gone off to receive significant and prestigious funding – FFS Board member and past grantee, Joel Schuman, MD, received the Chapalimaud Award, the world's most prestigious vision research prize. We are confident that our 2018-2019 grantees will follow in the steps of Dr. Schuman and others like him.

FFS is dependent of donor generosity to support our critically important grant award program. Support is raised each year by direct mail and social media, through our annual Lights-On Gala and Strike for Sight, a bowling event started almost a decade ago by John LaSpina, another Board member. We are also grateful for ongoing funding partnerships with other vision non-profits including American Macular Degeneration Foundation, International Retinal Research Foundation, Aniridia Foundational International and Saving Sight, to list but a few. These mutually beneficial partnerships allow both organizations to fund critical research while wisely stewarding their donor dollars.

During 2019, FFS received one of the largest gifts in its history, a \$500,000 contribution from the estate of Madame Mae Sun Wang. Interest from this magnificent gift will be used to fund glaucoma and macular degeneration research. Generosity such as Madame Wang's ensures FFS's future. Please consider including us in your estate plans. A planned gift will help fulfill Mildred's dream of eye and vision research for generations to come.

As always, we thank you for your partnership with FFS during the past two years – as a donor, grantee, Scientific Review Committee member, fundraising volunteer or friend. We look forward to continuing our work together, curing blinding eye diseases and finding better treatments for those afflicted with vision disorders.

In 1980, while a Resident in Ophthalmology at the University of Illinois Eyeand Ear Infirmary, I received a Fight for Sight Grant-in-Aid to study the early receptor potential (ERP) in several human hereditary retinal diseases. Like many others, this helped me in establishing my credentials in eye and vision research. Later, as a faculty member at the University of Michigan and now in my current role as Director of the National Eye Institute, NIH, I have come to appreciate and respect Fight for Sight's grant program even more for a variety of reasons: among them that it serves as an entry point for fledgling researchers, many of whom go on to international prominence. This program also creates life-long linkages between giants in ophthalmology andthose on the cusp of their careers. I dare say my own career might have taken a different trajectory without early support from Fight for Sight. I applaud the organization for its role ensuring the development of world-class eye and vision scientists for over seven decades.

Since 2014, Montefiore Medical Center/Albert Einstein College of Medicine has received five Fight for Sight awards. One of the significant non-financial benefits of the program is in how former FFS grantees mentor their younger colleagues. Rebecca McGreal, PhD, who received a 2016 Post-Doctoral Award, was mentored by Alves Cvekl, PhD, recipient of a 1998 Grant-in-Aid. Other faculty, myself included, have also served as mentors, learning more about FFS in the process. This institutional peer support is often the beginning of rewarding professional

affiliations and lifelong friendships.

In 1989, while a fellow at Massachusetts Eye & Ear Infirmary, I received a Grant-In-Aid which, as it did for so many of my colleagues, helped launch my career as a ophthalmology researcher. A few years later, while at New England Medical Center - Tufts University, I had the opportunity to mentor Drs. Tamar Pedut-Kloizman and Lisolette Pieroth, who received a FFS Post-Doctoral Award (1995) and **Summer Student Fellowship** (1996) respectively. Dr. Pedut-Kloizman has gone on to a distinguished career at Bnai Zion Medical Center in Haifa and has also collaborated with me on scholarly articles relating to glaucoma. Dr. Pieroth has also gone on to a distinguished career in ophthalmology and, like Dr. Pedut-Kloizman, has been a collaborator on scholarly works. This is at the heart of a Fight For Sight grant, where someone who begins as a mentor, becomes a colleague and friend in the decades that follow. Mildred Weisenfeld would be proud of how her original vision has grown.

2018 Grants-in-Aid (GIA) are intended to fund pilot projects and generate preliminary results for investigators who have limited or no other research funding. Grants-in-Aid are awarded to junior faculty members who are developing their independent scientific skills. A majority of Grant-in-Aid recipients go on to successfully compete for larger, multi-year awards from NIH or other governmental and private sources, utilizing preliminary results generated by their FFS-funded GIA award.





Scientific Review Committee (SRC)

The Scientific Review Committee (SRC) is charged with reviewing and evaluating grant applications for Summer Student Fellowships, Post-Doctoral Awards and Grants-in-Aid. It is composed of prominent research scientists, academic ophthalmologists and clinician scientists representing a broad range of disciplines in ophthalmology, vision and eye research. Many received a FFS grant earlier in their career and/or have served as FFS mentors to succeeding generations of awardees.

FFS strives to create a diverse group of reviewers representing many of the finest academic and clinical institutions across the country, who help us choose the best and brightest young students and scientists for our awards. Our review process is modeled on the peer review system utilized by the National Institutes of Health, which evaluates and ranks each application on scientific merit, strength of institutional resources and clinical relevance. The SRC meets annually to review award applications. We are extremely grateful for their assistance, dedication and hard work.






